## Ralph's letter to his nephew, Francis Plowden

## Jhesu

Master Anthony Skinner having a determination to stay 3 or 4 days here about his business<sup>1</sup> was yesterday about two of the clock drawn away by letters commended unto him from Shiplake so as he presently departed and went directly to Weston meaning to hasten to the court with all the speed he may. His desire is you should be advertised and make account that you will follow with all convenient speed <you> ^ <may>^ his business being best known to you, in which also he sayeth you have some interest. This must suffice to hasten you away. Between this and Thursday you shall, God willing, find me herein and I hope you will not pass by without visiting us.

Taxis<sup>2</sup> is for certain either at Gravelines or arrived in England. I do make stay to follow your direction until I may speak with you only I may fortune to see my good neighbour <sup>3</sup> and to entreat him as with convenience I may. You know my credit is not great.

Commend me to your Self and to Mistress Mary. From Skilts the first of August 1603 Your Loving uncle Raff Sheldon
